Professional Identity Formation and Communities of Practice | November 16, 2018

Founding Director of the Wayne State University School of Medicine (WSUSOM) Office of Learning and Teaching, and Professor in the Department of Family Medicine and Public Health Sciences Concerns for the hidden curriculum, disparities in health and heath care, and the increasing technical and moral problems of medicine have led to a resurgence of interest on physician professionalism and professionalism education. This emphasis has been accompanied by exploration of the process whereby the individual is transformed from layperson to a practitioner of medicine, i.e., acculturated into the values, customs, and goals of medicine and the individual's identity as physician is shaped.

Reframing Medical Education to Support Professional Identity Formation. Drs. Richard and Sylvia Cruess and their colleagues at McGill University have emerged as articulate spokespersons for the focus on Professional Identity Formation. From their offices at McGill, Richard and Sylvia will review the current understanding of the process whereby the individual is acculturated into the profession, encourage the SEMCME audience to examine their personal journeys as clinicians and educators, and explore the challenges of promoting Professional Identity Formation in residency.

Reflection and Reflective Capacity. Small groups will discuss the use of reflection in their clinical work and teaching. Individuals will be asked to share an event that influenced their personal Professional Identity Formation and to speculate on the implications for facilitating Professional Identity Formation in residents.

Developing Professional Identity through Communities of Practice. Following an overview of the literature on Communities of Practice, Dr. Laurie Richlin will review the establishment of Learning Communities at Wayne State School of Medicine and implications for Professional Identity Formation in Communities of Practice.

Participants will be able to:

- Describe the stages of Professional Identity Formation.
- Evaluate current teaching with respect to Role Modeling, Mentoring, and supporting Reflective Capacity.
- Discuss the status of assessment of Professional Identity Formation.
- Define Communities of Practice and the role of the same in Professional Identity Formation.
- Describe steps and challenges in developing safe, authentic Communities of Practice.
